SECURITY FLAW IN WEB BROWSER AUTOFILL TOOLS CAN STEAL YOUR DATA — Web browsing can sometimes feel like navigating a huge minefield. It's filled with hidden foxholes, traps, and other tricky dangers that can endanger you even when you least expect it. These days, nothing seems safe online — there's always an enterprising hacker poking holes on every would-be stalwart system out there. Every day it seems, a vulnerability is always waiting to be discovered. And who knew even one of the conveniences of modern browsers can be exploited to gather more information about you and even potentially steal your data?

HOW TO FIND AND DELETE GOOGLE ASSISTANT'S STORED VOICE DATA — Every time you use Google Assistant, a recording of the command is uploaded to Google—that's how it does what it does. A copy of this recording is also stored on your Google account, unless you manually go in and remove it. So, why is this data stored? Well, it can be useful to have. For example, if your Google Home stops responding to commands, you can hunt these recordings down and listen to them, which can help you pinpoint mic/listening issues. It's valuable. WHY YOU NEED TO BE ON NEXTDOOR, THE LOCAL SOCIAL NETWORK — There are all sorts of niche social networks. There are networks for gamers. Networks for beer drinkers. Even networks for academics. But possibly the best social network that you haven't joined yet is Nextdoor. Nextdoor is a free, private, local social network for people that live in a neighborhood. That might not sound like such a cool thing, but hear me out. It's a fantastically useful tool. HOW WILL THE MELTDOWN AND SPECTRE FLAWS AFFECT MY PC? – What Are Meltdown and Spectre?– Spectre is a "fundamental design flaw" that exists in every CPU on the market—including those from

AMD and ARM as well as Intel. There is currently no software fix, and it will likely require a complete hardware redesign for CPUs across the board—though thankfully it is difficult to exploit, according to security researchers. It's possible to protect against specific Spectre attacks, and developers are working

Artificial Intelligence (AI)

We're finding more and more examples of <u>Artificial Intelligence (AI)</u> in the world around us. We have intelligent assistants like Alexa, Siri, and OK Google. There are now self-driving cars. We have programs that beat champions in chess and the Chinese board game Go. Expert systems like Watson can beat Jeopardy champions, or assist doctors in diagnosing patients. Danbury Area Computer Society's guide to this subject was Andrew Ribeiro, who leads an <u>AI Meetup group</u> at the <u>Danbury Hackerspace</u>, and is cofounder of <u>Knowledge-Exploration Systems</u>.

Andrew concentrated on the new area of deep learning, itself a subset of <u>machine learning (ML)</u>, which "gives computers the ability to learn without being explicitly programmed." Deep learning requires access to massive amounts of data that enables it to recognize patterns. His talk painted a picture of the historical trends in Artificial Intelligence that led to the emergence of deep learning and he discussed the state of the art models which are transforming the field.

Prior to deep learning, people used a huge variety of methods to solve specific Artificial Intelligence problems. With the popularization of deep learning, people have been using deep <u>neural networks</u> for

everything with record breaking success. Analogous to neural networks in the brain, artificial neural networks consist "of a number of simple, highly interconnected processing elements." From beating Go champions to self-driving cars, people in the field use neural networks in some capacity now.

Andrew's talk was similar to a presentation given at Google by Pedro Domingos, author of **The Master Algorithm: How the Quest for the Ultimate Learning Machine Will Remake Our World**.

For anyone interested in getting into the field, Andrew pointed to the mathematics that you will need to learn and online courses that will give you a good background.

Andrew Ribeiro is a computer scientist working in the field of Artificial Intelligence as the co-founder of Knowledge-Exploration Systems—a Danbury based AI and systems development contractor. He studied traditional computer science at WCSU and extended his knowledge to include AI by taking online courses, reading the classic books, and reading research papers in the field while applying the ideas to commercial R&D applications. Due to the intensive intellectual demands of mastering such a diverse field, he also co-founded Danbury AI in 2016 to foster a local community of AI experts and enthusiasts that help each other grow and learn.

A recent double-header was "Social Networking: What the Heck are Facebook, Twitter, and LinkedIn???," with APCUG's friend Abby Stokes explaining what everyone is talking about when they bring up Facebook, Twitter, and other social networking sites, and a demo of the "Clazio Smart Speaker" by Jon Mazur. This speaker is the first one to have both Amazon and Google smart assistants built-in.

In recognition of National Cyber Security Awareness Month videos were shown on computer security. Another month's videos concerned driverless cars, including technical details of how a car becomes aware of its environment and implications for much of society when changing from today's vehicles.

Chesapeake PC Users Group (CPCUG) AKA Chesapeake Area Technology Society (CATS) www.chesapeakepcusersgroup.org/

A recent CATS meeting covered "Cutting the Cable Cord - Streaming Media and Kodi Boxes," with Doug McClelland presenting using the Kodi System to use your internet connection to watch streaming media, and not your TV coax cabling. This allows dropping the television channel subscription part of your cable bill. The cable and telecom companies would like you to only use their set top boxes and their bundled content packages, but if you are not happy with the media content with the bundled TV channel packages that the cable or telecom companies give you, or with the video quality, then you can watch content using only your internet access service. This is legal in the United States, and your cable or telecom company cannot prevent it. They can say they provide easy to use service compared to Kodi, or other services. You decide.

Another session addressed the timely topic, "Moving your Data from a Hard Disk Drive (HDD) to a Solid-State Drive (SSD)." This included (1) The different types of SSD; (2) Installing a 2.5-inch drive version of a Solid-State Drive (SSD) into a Desktop PC; (3) What adapters may be needed to install the SSD into the PC; (4) Disconnecting and connecting the SATA power and SATA data cables, and if a straight through or a 90-degree data cable is needed; and (5) The migration software, and the utilities that monitor SSD health. Focus was on installing a Samsung 2.5-inch EVO 500GB SSD, and cover the PC case adapters, Samsung migration software, and SSD health monitor issues. If time, a brief coverage of the Crucial 525GB MX300 2.5-inch SSD, and the Toshiba_OCZ 480GB SSD, other data migration software, NAND solid state circuit issues, and some PC motherboard Setup (BIOS, and UEFI BIOS) issues.

The Commonwealth Governor's School "Kilroy" Robotics Team who demonstrated one of the robots they designed, built, and are currently using in match competition. The team is sustained by its members who develop marketing strategies for financing, as well as design, construct, program, and operate robots for regional, state, and national robotics events. Team members participate in a variety of activities throughout the year to include presentations to sponsors and other schools. The FPCUG truly enjoyed their presentation.

VFW Post 3103 Commander Tai Mamea spoke passionately to the FPCUG about the history of Veterans Day, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and their rich tradition of serving veterans, military families, and local communities. Commander Mamea emphasized the VFW's advocacy for veteran's benefits and encouraged those with questions to contact the VFW. He also recommended that our veterans consider joining the VFW or other like service organizations.

Northern Neck Computer Users Group (NNCUG) www.nncug.net/

Bruce McMillan presented "Evolving Automotive Technology," beginning with 1930's technology through the 1973 gas shortage, progress through the 1980s/1990s/2000s and advised that, now, most cars have computers that are more powerful than an early 2000's desktop computer. Electric, hybrid or fossil fueled vehicles will require complex computer systems. Some of the current features in today's vehicles include automatic braking in emergencies, lane departure warnings, self-parking assistance and automatic speed controls. One drawback of these features is that they all are line of sight. Bruce noted that information stored in your vehicle can be accessed by both the police and attorneys. At the current time, Virginia law provides for taking vehicle data with the owner's consent, court order, the diagnosis, service, repair of a vehicle, the dispatch of emergency personnel, and with probable cause of an offense.

Some key technologies are the controller area network. This will be the foundation for driverless cars and other traffic related issues. Some of the possible uses for vehicle technology would be used for traffic signal priority. It could also be used for:

- vehicle refueling management, and to personalize taxi dispatch services.
- financial transactions such as toll collections, parking payment and rental car payments and processing.
- pedestrian safety at intersections, and help with traffic management such as car convoys.

Tesla and Google are now developing self-driving cars. General Motors is now testing self-driving cars. A benefit of self-driving vehicles is increased automatic safety. It would also allow older drivers to continue mobility safety. It would reduce automobile ownership and related expenses.

A possible drawback to this technology would occur when you are involved in an accident. Where does the legal liability lie? Will the auto maker, system designers, coders, or vehicle owner be libel?

The Genealogy Computer Group covered the intriguing topic, "Our topic will be Men of the same nametips for sorting them out."

FUD & the Computer User

Fear, Uncertainty, and Doubt, above all other obstacles, are the most paralyzing if we are to be honest with ourselves. These are nothing new, and can impact many areas of our lives.

How does a Computer User fight back against FUD?

Fear – Many people are afraid of doing something wrong and "breaking" their computer. Good news ... unless you deliberately smash it, the chance that you will do something to "break" your machine is remote.

You might do something to confuse it that requires help to put back on the right path. You may even need to reinstall it (do you have a backup?). As a human, however, you are VERY unlikely to "break" it.

Uncertainty – There are two tools to remember if you are unclear what you are trying to do:

- 1. Undo -- This can be found in most menus, but the fastest way to access it is Ctrl-Z on a Windows PC or CMD-Z on an Apple OS machine. Another form of this is Delete/ Backspace.
- 2. Exit without Saving If you save often (especially if you are formatting something and reach a point where you like what you see) you can always exit/discard document changes and start over from the last point you saved. It may sound like a time-waster, but it IS A FRUSTRATION SAVER.

Doubt – Everyone CAN use a computer, though not everyone will be comfortable using all the tools a computer provides. When in doubt, ask a friend if they have tried something. Pull up the HELP section. Consider going to the Library or buying a reference guide for the program you are using. The only point of misplaced confidence when using a computer is: *I am sure I can break it!*

FUD also relates to members stepping up to volunteer for a board / committee position.

Fear – I don't know enough about computers / technology. Many of the positions don't need to be filled by someone with a lot of tech knowledge. The board runs the club operations; many of your members can use their business experience to help do this.

Uncertainty – I don't know if I can do the job. I need to know everything required. Do you have 'job descriptions' for board and committee positions so they know what needs to be accomplished? Are they written in plain language with bullet points, etc.? Are they up-to-date with the current status of your club?

Doubt - I'm afraid of making a mistake doing (whatever). (Again, JDs.) Will the person who previously held the position help in transitioning to the new person?

Do you talk one on one when asking for help or in the front of the group where no one raises their hand? Do you know your members' strengths? Do you have them start with a small volunteer experience to get their feet wet? Can you find two volunteers who will cover the position? Are you watching to make sure they aren't beginning to suffer from burn-out? Do you recognize your volunteers and remember to thank them at meetings, in the newsletter, at a volunteer recognition function?

Do you really need two vice presidents, three directors, a sergeant-at-arms, a member-at-large, etc. Maybe it's time to review your group's by-laws. Why have 8-10 board members when your group has fewer members?



ONE GROUP'S DOWNSIZING BRINGS NEW MEMBERS: Some groups decide to meet every other month or quarterly. This is the story of the VCC by Ron Kehn, APCUG Rep.

For as long as I have been a member we have always rented our own clubhouse and had numerous computers to support the courses and sigs we ran. As our membership shrank and our income from courses dropped off it became apparent over the last couple years that we could no longer afford the cost of a clubhouse as well as the associated insurance fee and internet fees.

We tried to find other groups to use our facilities and managed to interest a local group working on Raspberry Pi computers. Alas, things still looked bleak so early in 2017 the executive decided to join forces with one of the local senior centers and we moved our resources in late May. Our computer club sold our furniture and disposed of all but 6 towers and monitors (with keyboards and mice, of course) as well as a couple of laptops. Our lending library of books was offered to members but, alas, a lot of stuff ended up in a dumpster. This almost brought tears to the eyes of some of the long-time members.

We took some of the funds raised from sale of assets to buy a couple more laptops and the decision has been made to purchase a few more. Currently, we have about 5 sessions a week ranging from 2 to 4 hours. Some of these are the dedicated equivalent of SIGS and some are more of a tutorial type arrangement.

The club benefits as we no longer pay for rent, internet, phone, or insurance. The seniors group benefits as it is another service they can offer to their members. The tutorial sessions are free to attend but the other sessions require a user fee.

There is quite a reduction in cost to members of the senior's group, so a lot of our members have joined their group and the computer club has gained new members from people attending other events at the center. There are now about 10% more members than before the move.

There is however one big drawback to the arrangement. Each session we take our computers and other equipment from a couple of cupboards and put it all away at the end – hence the desire to gradually replace all the towers. We did have to fit them with Wi-Fi adapters as there is no wired Ethernet. If you check the home page for the Victoria Computer Club, you will also see we have added their logo as part of ours.

We meet in the library and one day in the activities room.

How Many is Enough (What's the Ideal Board of Directors Size)?

Organization boards aren't like baseball, football, basketball, hockey teams, needing a fixed number of "players" for operation. In fact, no one size fits all groups. A quarterly meeting, I attend is now run quite well by one person, replacing the committee that ran it for years. So, it's worth being flexible about board size -- define a size range in bylaws, don't cement in a specific number of slots that may be hard to fill or (being optimistic) confining if there are abundant volunteers. And, if considering a change like this for future flexibility, consider reviewing the full bylaws document for other change opportunities. For example, it's likely time to remove references to a club BBS, a long-lost meeting site, and other historical remnants. Short and general governing documents are much more pleasant to operate under.

Celebrate the New Year, Members, Volunteers, Milestones, and Resources

Take opportunities to recap years ending and note new ones beginning. Highlight what matters and call for volunteers to pitch in. It's always worthwhile reminding members that user groups/clubs/organizations don't run themselves -- it takes many people in diverse roles to stay in business year after year helping members and communities. Here's an exemplary message received from PATACS, Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society (<www.patacs.org>):

President's Message - 2018

Thank you for being a member of the Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society! As of December 18th, there were 96 of us. I hope you'll encourage family and friends to join in our computer and technology exercises in lifelong learning. Your referral will earn a six-month membership extension for yourself.

2018 brings many milestones. In May, we celebrate the 6th anniversary of PATACS establishment, from the merger of WACUG and NCTCUG. But we'll be rolling out the big birthday cake for a real milestone - the organization's founding 40 years ago in May of 1978 as the Tandy Computer User's Group. Thus, we kicked off in the year following the introduction of three groundbreaking personal computers - the Commodore PET, TRS80 Model 1, and the Apple II.

Show-and-Tell Demonstrations Make Great User Group Presentations

In recent months, I've seen very effective/informative informal demonstrations/presentations on members' favorite programs. Folks with long memories recognize this as a once-very popular meeting format. I gave two such presentations on Norton Security Premium and CCleaner, including a few PowerPoint slides and (mostly) a tour through program facilities/functions/options. Such talks are simple to prepare -- everyone has a few key programs with which they're very familiar -- and an easy way to go "back to the future" with member presentations. Sometimes having group leaders demonstrate such talks will encourage others to volunteer.

Do You Know Origin of the Word "SWAG"?

Attending trade shows, one collects swag. But I never thought about the word's origin. In that context, I wouldn't have thought it had a definition my wife might use, "a curtain or piece of fabric fastened to hang in a drooping curve." Urban Dictionary to the rescue, explaining it as "SWAG stands for Stuff We All Get, typically when attending an expo or trade show. You get SWAG when people at booths hand out free stuff like pens, prizes, etc." Yes indeed. And I have plenty of swag from various user groups -- logoed coasters, screwdrivers, letter openers, etc. Such giveaways -- with URL and organization tagline -- can be very effective marketing tools. For example, I discovered my first PC user group by seeing something it distributed away on a friend's coffee table. Especially in these days of fewer printed newsletters, branded objects can spread the word very cost effectively.

Let It Snow ... But Let Members Know

Does your group have a stated meeting cancellation policy? That's typically needed in areas subject to meaningful snow and other disruptive weather, but I suspect that other regions suffer other indignities affecting meetings. So, it's worth having a documented/publicized default set of rules -- for example, "If county schools are closed, meetings that day are cancelled" -- plus a way to notify people of other changes/cancellations, such as MeetUp, group website, or mailing list, text message.

Don't let people who struggle getting to a meeting be disappointed by there not being one.

Why Should People Join Your Group?

If you're reading this magazine, you likely strongly support your user group and the user group concept. And you probably have canned speeches for recruiting members, soliciting volunteers, and explaining your organization to outsiders. Surprise: every officer, director, volunteer, and member have a different set of reasons they joined and talking points about your group. That's a wonderful marketing tool if you collect them all. And a creative way to do that is to run a contest to gather the ten best reasons to join your group. Encourage people to submit reasons, publish the list to members for voting, and reward contributors of, say the top three vote getters with something like a six-month membership extension or (see the SWAG article in this issue!) a group logoed gift. Another way to enhance membership recruiting/retention/reclamation is to explicitly make it someone's job, with a title like Director (or Vice President) of Membership.

Cash or Credit? Be Flexible and Modern!

I've recently read multiple articles about a trend towards businesses not accepting cash. It's real, though slow moving and still hardly pervasive. But people are often caught out without cash or checks and so not susceptible to even the most compelling sales pitches -- as, for example, why they should join your group, or buy raffle tickets, or make a donation. Fortunately, technology fixes that: most people DO have credit cards or pay-by-wallet apps on smartphones. So, consider enabling your group to take such payments using Square or another such low-friction service. Small fees paid are justified by collecting payments -- and new members! -- you'd otherwise have missed.

Recordkeeping Pays Off

As an APCUG Advisor, I deal with a couple dozen user groups spread across seven states and the District of Columbia. Lacking a spectacular memory, I use a couple simple tools to keep track of these groups and (especially) my dealings with them.

First, I track in detail every interaction (email, phone calls, visits, meetings, etc.) with every group. Doing this lets me pick up conversations months later, without scratching my head to remember whether I'm waiting on them or they're waiting on me or what was last said or requested. In a text file for each group, at top, I have current officers with contact information. The rest of the file is a log: entries with dates and names. I used something similar when I was CPCUG's Director of (Meeting) Programs, to track interactions with potential and committed speakers. Many user group volunteer positions can use something similar to track interactions and avoid missed opportunities and miscommunications. And such a log is a great present to give a successor in a detail-oriented position.

Second, I have a file with Region 2 's groups' meeting dates (e.g., third Tuesday, second Saturday). This lets me plan efficient travel -- for example, visiting VA's FPCUG/NNCUG when their meetings align, and same for NJ's PPCU/BCUG. Whoever books meeting speakers might use a similar file for coordinating speaker arrangements with nearby groups, swapping publicity outreach with appropriate organizations, or arranging joint meetings when a speaker on shared interests is booked.
